













Our parting President, John C. shakes the hand of Eric W., as he is sworn in during the South Coaster's Annual Picnic!






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Well, it's done: we have a new board, a new president, and a full riding calendar. First, I want to say that it is an honor to serve as your president for the next two years. Kudos to John C!


Harry Hoffman, Newsletter Editor

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

How do you begin an epic saga that started out as a fiasco???

Leading up to the 7 Passes Ride was a new experience for me as I had never been on a 5 day ride, had a brand new Garmin Zumo XT that I had no idea how to use and I was still recuperating from hand surgery. I was excited about the 5-day ride but also apprehensive as it looked like there were going to be some very long days in the saddle and I had never done multiple days in the high 300 and low 400 miles.

the long haul up to the turnoff for Tioga Pass. A quick gas stop at the Mobil Station got gas before heading up Hwy 120. 
















After a short ride up 395 to Topaz Lake we headed up Monitor Pass. Monitor starts out very desolate but once over the pass and heading to Ebbetts Pass it turned back into the beauty of the Sierras we expected. More beautiful lakes, streams and never-ending pines. Ebbetts is very unique as the road is very narrow and there is no center line. There are also many very tight twisties but also some beautiful scenery. 



Hi Steve,

Thanks again for leading the ride. I did enjoy myself, and like any long motorcycle ride there is adventure. I would be happy to write a paragraph or two on my experience: the good, bad, and the ugly (nothing terrible, just stuff I was not expecting). I'm not sure where your newsletter is, etc., but here is an attorney/smart ass's review of the trip.

My 7 Passes ride around and through Yosemite this June with your BMW club was an adventure, and quite memorable at that; thanks for including me it, the lunch/dinner/hotel plannings, as well as the afterdinner libations. My "sponsor" for this ride, Paul Kirch, called me early Thursday morning alleging hehad Covid, and of course couldn't go. I got his text and picture of a test strip, and wasn't sure whether to congratulate him on getting pregnant past the age of 70 or to have real concerns. BTW, Paul has made a miraculous recovery and is about to set off from Southern California up and through a large loop of Eastern Canada).

The initial plan was that Paul and I would travel half days or so with the pack, and then break off on our own to meet up later in the evening. Paul jokingly advised me "Matt, whatever you do, don't be yourself on this trip." I knew the adventure had begun before I even got on my bike. As a non-BMW rider, I also knew I was the ""new" kid on the block; the good natured ribbing was expected, and it started as soon as I arrived at the Panera Bread parking in La Canada and took off my helmet. The jokes about my Italian motorcycle, and it's EFI warning light turning on and off (for the first time ever) on my ride there gave me assurances that I was with the right group.





When your club says, "KSU" at X:00 hours, you mean it; and actual members aren't immune to being left behind if they don't arrive on time. As a reminder, many non-BMWS' don't have gigantic panniers, tail cases, built in navigation and phone chargers, and endless glove boxes. In the future, if you ever do let a non-BMWers join your trips, or even have a new club rider, you might consider having a "5 minute leniency rule" for an acceptable delay time for KSU so that no riders, even your own club members, aren't rushed to the point of not properly checking their bikes, farkles, make shift luggage, jacket pockets, connectors, etc. This is especially true on quick lunch breaks when the riders in the back finally get their food only after the lead riders, and first in line, have calmly completed their meals.

An unnamed rider (no names given to protect the guilty) dropped his bike while leaving the very first parking lot in La Canada, and I got the chance to help pick it up. The beauty of your BMWs' is that slow spills are not ride ending as it would be on my Aprilia being all unprotected plastic. I happily fell near the back of the pack on our way to Kernville while trying to figure out the general rules and pace of the convoy and enjoying some great roads. I admit that I was a little lazy in my riding style because of the whole sciatica thing, and not placing the balls of my feet on my pegs caused the tread of my left boot to come loose from scraping on some twisties. The pace did pick up some times, but nothing insane. I fixed the boot problem with buying some super glue (and a bottle of white wine for another club member) and used the weight of the bed post to seal the deal.

I'm technically "geographically challenged," so unless I hear the Google or Siri directions through my Sena, or Paul telling me in advance the route and/or actually following another rider, I would constantly get lost on longer rides. Riding with your BMW club solved that whole "directions" problem for me, allowed me to enjoy the ride, and I thank you profusely. I don't usually pay attention to the names of the roads and highways I'm on while motorcycling, and unless I looked at the email itinerary, I couldn't tell you more than 1 or 2 of the names of the passes we even went over.



That's another bonus for Beemers, the Garmins and whatever navigation system on your bikes definitely help show you where you have been. Oh, and turning on Air Drop on my phone before the last day of our trip would have helped me get some of the group pics too: thank you Carl for your assistance and for sharing the ride up. It didn't matter that I was on an analog bike: the roads were varied from fast and flat highways, gravel, sweepers, and hair pins in some of the most beautiful country in the world.







Because my back was an issue, and I didn't realize this was a non-stop marathon for the main group, I admit that I was a little slow sometimes to the bike, and didn't join the meals because I was laying flat trying to ice it. Eventually, I rode up towards the front a few times in later days to get a little faster, and to see some great riding from a club member when he avoided an oncoming two up blue sport touring motorcycle cross the double yellows into his lane on a blind curve. I initially said it was a blue Ducati that got wide, but I have I now profess that it was the exact same make/model of Aprilia Futura that I was riding, only in blue instead of grey.

The strongest memories I have are not the roads we traveled, beautiful parks, my peg spinning loose to the smooth underside from standing and stretching so often or some suspect hotels, but of the group of riders, their histories, and their help (thanks Rob for helping me pull my bike up vertical after you honked behind me at a rest stop, and I almost dropped it: oops, I said I was going to protect the guilty.)

In the small number of your club that I rode with I learned you have a flat track racer that also valets bikes in his off time, including mine down a steep incline with a 90 degree turn, one time world speed world record holder for multiple motorcycle classes; daredevils that raced and flipped speed boats at over 100 mph and even skied behind them some times, jet ski national champion contenders; a business owner willing to play "Uber Eats" for me and deliver me a dinner while I was laid up icing my back; a tech guy that is an incredible rider especially given only 3 years riding experience; former tennis contenders; an Antonio Banderas imitator in Vegas; a practical neighbor of mine whose kids' attended the same high schools as mine, and likes to take naps (thanks again for traveling the windy and hot 395 back with me; I will set up the dinner soon); and someone willing to accept a 4/5 filled bottle of scotch as a gift in their trunk cooler when I didn't have space for it in my limited size panniers (what a giver;)

Happy trails, keep the shiny side up, and until we meet again.

South Coasters' Club Rides

Chief Joseph Rally June 16-19, 2022

The first 3 days of my ride were spent riding with the club on the 7-Passes route, but with two minor exceptions: During the Tioga Pass portion I split off from the group on a 34-mile detour up to Yosemite Valley and rejoined the group in Sonora at the Gunn House. Then, while the group stopped for the night at South Lake Tahoe, I continued on to Reno to visit a friend. Otherwise, it was the same route through the Sherman, Tioga, Sonora, Monitor, Ebbetts, Carson, and Luther Passes that everyone else rode.









From Reno my plan was to ride straight to Eagle Idaho, but the Boise area was getting hammered by the same storm that did all the damage in Yellowstone.

I wasn't real keen on riding in heavy rain and hail, so I got a room in Winnemucca for the night. The next day I rode up US-95 to Eagle. The rain had moved east, but it was cloudy and cold. Then I spent the next 3 nights at my sister & brother-in-law's home. The days were warm and clear and the nights were just a little on the chilly side.

On Thursday (Day 8 of my trip) I rode from Eagle to the Grant County Fairgrounds in



John Day Oregon via US-26 (the John Day Highway). This was the first leg of the trip that I had my camping gear and tent on the bike (I shipped it to my sister's house) and I arrived at the Fairgrounds with 1,651 miles on the trip odometer.









The Fairgrounds was the venue for the Chief Joseph Rally and that's where I spent the remainder of Thursday through Sunday morning.

On Thursday afternoon I explored the fairgrounds and downtown John Day on foot. On Saturday I went on the Cowboy Ride and Lunch which was a delightful ride through the



EDITOR'S COMMENTS

July is here and so is Summer in Southern California! No warm-weather riding gear. Cooling vests, Sea to Summit bagwith cold water is ready. I suggest a LD Comfort or Klim's Aggressor Cool -1.0 shirt, if you are so inclined. Don't forget to hydrate! Bring plenty of water and drink often. The #1 cause of dehydration and mental fog is loss of water from the

heat and riding! Yes, even riding. Read on —



When temperatures are in the 70-80°'s, you are loosing overall hydration through movement of airflow (riding) AND perspiration. Raise the temperatures to 90-100°'s degrees and you HAVE TO DRINK WATER / ELECTROLYTES to stay hydrated and ahead of your fluid loses. If you get behind and start to feel tired/drained, then STOP. Cool off! Drink water now and continue to drink OFTEN when you ride again.

If you have coffee in the morning, keep it to just the morning. Follow it with water to hydrate BEFORE you ride out. Caffeine only will work against you.
